#### End of Season:

- Garden gates will be locked for the season on December 1st. Each garden plot should be cleaned out and all personal property removed by the end of season. Everything remaining at the Garden after this date is considered abandoned and subject to
- Starting January 1st 2026, you will receive a notice to your email regarding plot renewal for the 2026 season. Renewals must be submitted by March 1st, or your plot may be reassigned to a gardener on the waiting list.
- The garden will reopen March 1st 2026.

### **Seasonal Tips:**

- Shred fall leaves using a leaf mulcher or lawn mower. Applying a few inches of mulched leaves in the fall will allow time for them to decompose and add valuable nutrients to the soil.
- Store all tools in their proper place indoors, never outdoors where they will rust over winter. Clean, oil and repair hand tools, repaint handles, sharpen blades to remove rust, and clean off plant material and dirt.
